My vision for Geog 419 is as a series of linked research skills workshops. These will teach the methods necessary to tackle research problems that integrate insights from both human and physical geography. Ultimately, the student will create a portfolio that could form the solid basis of an application for graduate school. Alternatively, the class will provide the experience necessary for entrance into the research streams of government, an NGO, or the corporate world.

The research problem you work on for the term will come from one of 20 off-campus *Community Based Research* partnerships. More details at our first meeting in the fall, however for example, some of you will act as consultants on issues such as waste management, program assessment, policy analysis, life-cycle analysis, project evaluation, etc.
